Levi, Jakob Long, Blake Phillips, Marta Richenburg, 11 Austin Rook, Gus Scharnhorst, Parker Vulgamore, and Jackson Willis 12 13 WHEREAS, The elections procedures of the Kansas State University Student Governing Association 14 (KSU SGA) should be as accessible, accurate, and non-controversial as possible: 15 16 In the 2018 and 2019 KSU SGA General Elections, the disqualification of one of the two WHEREAS, 17 presidential tickets after the Primary Election and before the General Election resulted in 18 significant disruptions to and controversy regarding each elections season: 19 20 WHEREAS, The 2018-2019 KSU SGA Student Senate challenged the following Student Senates to 21 reform KSU SGA elections by passing Resolution 18/19/49, which called upon Student 22 Senate to "discover the most equitable process for conducting and regulating elections;" 23 24 WHEREAS, One unique feature of the KSU SGA elections system is the top-two primary for 25 Presidential and Vice Presidential Elections; 26 27 WHEREAS, Participating in a top-two primary requires voters to vote twice and still prevents them 28 from fully expressing their preferences between more than three tickets for KSU SGA 29 President and Vice President; 30 31 WHEREAS, Every KSU SGA General Election since 2003 without a disqualification had greater voter 32 turnout than the corresponding Primary Election: 33 34 WHEREAS, A ticket's withdrawal or disqualification from a top-two primary currently results in the 35 third place Presidential Candidate from the Primary Election being placed on the General 36 Election ballot; 37 38 WHEREAS, This creates an almost insurmountable hurdle for that third place ticket to comply with 39 the elections regulations and get elected, especially if they are placed on the ballot right 40 before voting starts; 41 42 WHEREAS, Instant-Runoff Voting (IRV) is an alternative system for single-winner elections where voters rank the candidates or tickets on their ballot in order of preference using numbers 43 44 from least to greatest; 45 If no single ticket receives a majority of ballots allocated using each voter's single 46 WHEREAS, 47 highest preference, the ticket who receives the fewest number of highest preferences is 48 eliminated; 49 50 WHEREAS, If a voter's highest choice is eliminated, only then is their next-highest choice counted: 51 This process continues until one ticket wins a majority of ballots; 52 WHEREAS, 53

| 75 76 77 | WHEREAS, | IRV is also increasingly used by Student Governing Associations and other governing bodies across the country, including Auburn University, Oregon State University, Texas A&M University, and the University of Texas at Austin; |
| 78 79 80 81 | WHEREAS, | If KSU were to implement IRV, it would be the first college or university in the state of Kansas to do so; |
| 82 83 84 | WHEREAS, | IRV is recommended for use by private organizations in Roberts' Rules of Order when voting multiple times is impractical; |
| 85 86 87 88 89 | WHEREAS, | KSU SGA's current Service Level Agreement (SLA) with the KSU Information Technology Department (KSU IT) requires KSU SGA to pay a yearly fee of \$5,500 for upkeep and technology enhancements to our elections platform, but does not fund feature development; |
| 90 91 92 | WHEREAS, | KSU SGA's SLA defines a per-hour development fee of \$75 per hour for feature development of the KSU SGA Elections System; and |
| 93 94 95 | WHEREAS, | Implementing IRV would be an additional one-time cost of no more than \$4,000 in addition to the fee already specified in KSU SGA's SLA. |

- A. Any person meeting the qualifications of 01-0108 may become a candidate by complying with the requirements outlined in this section.
- B. Declaration of Candidacy. The Elections Commissioner shall determine the form of the declaration of candidacy. The declaration of candidacy shall include the name of the student, the student's Kansas State Wildcat Identification Number, the college the student is enrolled in, and the office being sought by the student. Any person seeking to have their name placed on the ballot as a candidate for Student Senator, member of the Board of Student Publications, and/or member of the Union Governing Board shall file a declaration of candidacy as required by the Elections Commissioner by 5:00 p.m. on the Friday two weeks prior to the General Election.
 - C. To be placed on the ballot, candidates for Student Body President must file a declaration of candidacy as required by the Elections Commissioner by 5:00 p.m. on the Friday two weeks prior to the Primary Election two weeks prior to the General Election. The declaration of candidacy shall include the name of the student, the student's Kansas State Wildcat Identification Number, and the primary college the student is enrolled in.
 - D. Student Body President candidates that move on to the general election must register their Vice-Presidential candidate and social media accounts as required by the Elections Commissioner no later than 5:00 pm on the Wednesday one week prior to the General Election. This registration shall include the name of the student, the student's Kansas State Wildcat Identification Number, and the primary college the student is enrolled in.
- 212 E. Mandatory Meetings.

- 1. Each Primary Election candidate shall attend one of at least two mandatory meetings completed by 5:00 p.m. on the Tuesday of the week immediately prior to the Primary Election as specified by the Elections Commissioner. A candidate may be excused from this requirement only if the candidate has received written permission from the Elections Commissioner prior to the last scheduled meeting. Within 24 hours of the last mandatory meeting, presidential campaigns will have scheduled a one on one meeting with the Elections Commissioner to take place prior to the primary election date.
 - a. Campaigns will register their social media accounts during the one-on-one meeting.
- 2. Each General Election candidate except candidates for Graduate Student Council offices shall attend one of at least two mandatory meetings, or shall view an informational video or transcript of the video prepared by the Elections Committee by 5:00 p.m. on the Tuesday one week prior to the general election as specified by the Elections Commissioner. A candidate may be excused from this requirement only if the candidate has received written permission from the Elections Commissioner prior to the last scheduled meeting.
- F. Expense and Contribution Reports. Each candidate except candidates for Graduate Student Council offices shall file an expense and contribution report as specified in 01-0120.
- 234 G. Campaign Action Reports. Each presidential ticket shall file a campaign action report as specified in 01-0120.

The value of labor by a candidate or registered campaign staff, 497 professional or otherwise, is not to be expensed or included as personal contributions. Any contribution 498 to a candidate from a business or non-student shall count towards the personal contribution limit. The 499 maximum amount any candidate may contribute toward their campaign shall be as follows: 500 1. The total amount a presidential ticket may contribute towards its 501 campaign including any contributions from sources other than qualified 502 students of Kansas State University shall be no more than \$300.00 for 503 the Primary election and no more than \$600.00 for both the Primary and 504 General elections. At no point may candidates advance funds in excess of 505 the funds above toward their campaign, even if the individual(s) makes 506 the excess amount back in third-party contributions. 507 2. The total amount a candidate for Union Governing Board or the Board of 508 Student Publications may contribute towards their campaign including 509 any contributions from sources other than qualified students of Kansas 510 State University shall be no more than \$125.00 for the General Election. 511 3. The total amount a candidate for Student Senate may contribute towards 512 their campaign including any contributions from sources other than qualified students of Kansas State University shall be no more than 513 514 \$50.00. 515 C. Contributions Limited. Contributions to any candidate may only be accepted if the contribution 516 is being received from a qualified student of Kansas State University (as determined under the Code through 01-0103), and limits for all contributions other than personal contributions shall be as follows: 517 518 1. Each Presidential Ticket shall not accept more than \$20.00 from any 519 other student. 520 2. Each candidate for Union Governing Board, the Board of Student 521 Publications, Student Senate, or College Council shall not accept more 522 than \$5.00 from any other student. 523 Sources of Values. The candidate shall be responsible for justifying the value of any services received or amounts spent, either through receipt or other reasonable means as determined by the 524 525 Elections Board. 526 527 SECTION 8. Chapter 01, Section 01-0120 of the KSU SGA Statutes shall be amended to read as 528 follows: 529 530 01-0120 Reporting Requirements 531 Common Reporting Requirements. A. 532 Deadlines. Primary Election candidates shall be required to submit all 1. 533 required reports to the Center for Student Involvement no later than 534 4:00 pm on the Friday prior to the Primary Election. General Election 535 candidates shall be required to submit all required reports to the Center 536 for Student Involvement no later than 4:00 pm on the Friday prior to the 537 General Election.

538 2. Verification. A member of the Elections Committee and the Elections 539 Commissioner shall review all required reports in order to check for 540 accuracy and completeness. The Elections Commissioner has the 541 authority to make final judgments on completeness of reporting or cost 542 of items where evidence of cost is absent. 543 3. All requested reports for Primary Election candidates must be submitted 544 by the Elections Commissioner to all persons requesting by 5:00 pm on 545 the Sunday prior to the Primary Election. All requested reports for 546 General Election candidates must be submitted by the Elections 547 Commissioner to all persons requesting by 5:00 pm on the Sunday prior 548 to the General Election. 549 Filing Jointly. If a candidate in a multi-winner election has exactly the 4. 550 same expenses (including shared expenses) as other candidate(s) and 551 has only participated in campaign actions with those candidate(s), then 552 the candidates may file required reports by submitting only one copy of 553 the reports to the Elections Commissioner. This copy must contain the 554 names of all candidates who are filing jointly. No candidate may file 555 jointly with multiple groups of candidates. 556 В. Expense and Contribution Reports. 557 1. Candidates who do not have any expenses and have no contributions 558 shall not be required to fill out an expense and contribution report. If 559 evidence of expenses for these candidates are found, it will be treated 560 as a major offense. The Elections Commissioner shall be responsible for 561 the provision of standardized expense and contribution report forms. 562 An expense and contribution report must be submitted by a candidate 563 for each office the student is a candidate for. 564 2. Content. Expense and contribution reports shall itemize all campaign 565 expenses, and the fair market value of each item listed as determined 566 whether by receipt, proof of purchase, or when unavailable, according 567 to those criteria and requirements of 01-0119. All campaign expenses 568 must be incurred or contractually agreed upon before each expense 569 report deadline, and no expense can be incurred after each report is 570 turned in unless the expense was contractually agreed on before the 571 report was turned in. The contribution section of the report shall 572 itemize each amount contributed to the campaign, the name of the 573 donor, and any other information deemed necessary by the Elections 574 Commissioner. 575 C. **Campaign Action Reports** 576 1. Candidates who do not have any campaign action to report shall 577 not be required to fill out a campaign action report. If evidence of 578 campaign actions for these candidates are found, it will be treated as a 579 major offense.
